The Mid-Cities Alumnae Panhellenic Association welcomes you to our Annual Spring Forum. Today we hope to answer your questions about sorority recruitment by providing ample information to you and your daughter. Each university has a dress code. Generally, the first rounds are casual in nature and girls can expect to wear shorts, their university recruitment t-shirt, sundresses, etc. The last few rounds are much more formal; heels and dresses are recommended for these rounds. During the luncheon, active sorority women will be seated at each table to answer any of the girl's questions about college life, sororities and academics. Our actives tend to be from local colleges and universities so there is a good chance you will be able to learn more about your prospective university; especially, Baylor University, Southern Methodist University, Texas A&M University, Texas Christian University, University of Oklahoma, University of Texas and University of North Texas.

Dear Parents,

We are excited that your daughter has an interest in college sorority recruitment. These upcoming four or five years will be one of great change and excitement for your daughter. Joining a sorority is a wonderful way for your daughter to instantly have a home away from home.

It has been documented that sorority members have a higher graduation rate than non-sorority members. They also have many opportunities for growth and leadership. Sororities place great importance on balancing social, philanthropic activities, academics, and sisterhood.

Recruitment is a mutual selection process in which potential members and sorority members decide if they share similar ideals and goals. It is important that your daughter keep an open mind during the recruitment process. Many young women find that they could be happy joining any one of the sororities on their campus.

Here's what to expect if your daughter receives a bid to a national sorority. Each sisterhood welcomes its new members with open arms assigning them a big sister who serves as a friend and a mentor while the girl is pledging her sorority. Sororities have a new member education program which stresses the importance of academics, as well as, educates members of their sorority's origins and beginnings. New members must also participate in study hall hours and actives are usually available for tutoring. Chapter retreat gives the new members and actives a chance to bond while in a setting outside of the university. Beyond the first year, opportunities abound for leadership roles within the sorority, the university Panhellenic Council, and much more. After graduation, your daughter always has a network of sisters around the country, alumnae groups to join, and collegiate chapters to assist. Sorority membership is a lifetime experience.

Greek Statistics:

- Every U.S. President and Vice President, except two in each office, born since the first social fraternity was founded in 1825 have been members of a fraternity
- 63% of the U.S. President's cabinet since 1900 have been Greek
- 76% of all Congressmen and Senators belong to a fraternity
- 40 of 47 U.S. Supreme Court Justices since 1910 were fraternity men
- Of the nation's 50 largest corporations, 43 are headed by fraternity men
- 85% of the FORTUNE 500 executives belong to a fraternity
- A U.S. government study shows that over 70% of all those who join a fraternity/sorority graduate, while under 50% of all non-fraternity/sorority persons graduate
- Over 85% of the student leaders on some 730 campuses are involved in the Greek community
- Over \$7 million is raised each year by Greeks nationally
- 850,000 hours are volunteered by Greeks annually

About the Mid-Cities Alumnae Panhellenic Association

Our organization is open to any alumnae affiliated with one of the 26 National Panhellenic Conference sororities. We meet on the third Tuesday evening of each month September through May. Our members primarily reside in the following cities: Bedford, Colleyville, Euless, Grapevine, Hurst, Keller and Southlake.

Panhellenic's Purpose: to INFORM women of current trends, to PROMOTE the fraternity system, to IMPROVE the Panhellenic image and to STIMULATE a continuing interest in Panhellenic affairs.

Monthly meeting activities vary from cooking demonstrations, speakers, wine & cheese pairing classes and community service projects. The two main tenets of the organization are to provide information to area high school senior girls interested in sorority recruitment and to raise money for collegiate scholarships which are awarded annually to two area sorority women.

Our Spring Forum is held annually to inform area high school girls about sorority recruitment. Each girl and her mother are given an informational packet which serves as a guide for sorority preparation. We ask that each girl complete the recruitment registration form and mail to our Master List Vice President so that she is registered with her area alumnae Panhellenic, in addition to, the university's Panhellenic.

In addition to our Spring Forum, our organization awards scholarships to active sorority women. The applicants must have graduated from a public or private high school in the Mid-Cities area. She must be in good standing with her sorority, exhibit strong morals/character and perform well academically. We do many forms of fundraising during the year in preparations for the scholarships. Some forms of fundraising include, but are not limited to: poinsettias sale, candy/nut sales and sorority paraphernalia sales. Last year's winners were Sarah Bienek of Keller High School, majoring in public relations at Texas Tech University and Kelsey Stanhouse of Southlake Carroll High School, studying marketing at the University of Oklahoma.

Greek Terminology and Alphabet

Active – A full member; one who has completed new membership and has been formally initiated by the college fraternity or sorority.

Alumnae Area Panhellenic – The organization of the alumnae of the National Panhellenic Conference sororities in your city or area.

Alumni/ae – Initiated members of a fraternity or sorority who have graduated.

Association of Fraternity Advisors (AFA) – The professional group for Greek Advisors in North America. The annual meeting is held each December to educate Greek Advisors and to stay current with the trends in the Greek World.

Bid – A formal invitation to membership from a sorority or fraternity to a potential new member.

Bid Day – The last day of membership recruitment which includes acceptance parties by sororities and fraternities.

Big Brother/Big Sister – The new member selects an active member to serve as their Big Brother/Big Sister. This initiated member serves as a resource, role model and problem solver for the new member.

Brother/Sister –The term used by active members when referring to each other.

Chapter – The local group of undergraduate students on a particular campus recognized by the university and the (Inter) national organization.

Dirty Rushing – Any violation of a rule set by the University Panhellenic Council as governed by the National Panhellenic Conference.

Formal Recruitment (formerly Rush) – Structured membership recruitment period in which sorority and fraternity members get acquainted with potential new members and gain new members. Formal Recruitment takes place either in the fall or spring depending on the university the PNM is attending.

Fraternity – A group of men bonded together by their ritual that contains the founding principles, ideals, and aspirations of the group. This term is also used to refer to sororities.

Greek – A student who is a member of a social fraternity or sorority.

Hazing – The mental or physical degradation of any person and it is strictly forbidden by Texas law and University policies.

Initiation – A spiritually based ritual which marks the acceptance of a lifetime commitment to the fraternity or sorority. This brings the new member into full membership.

Interfraternity Council (IFC) – IFC is an umbrella organization for the NIC member fraternities on each campus.

Legacy – A woman whose mother, sister, or grandmother is an initiated member of a sorority. A man whose father, brother, or grandfather is an initiated member of a fraternity.

National Interfraternity Conference (*N/C*) – The confederation of 64 men's fraternities.

National Panhellenic Conference (NPC) – The representative body governing 26 Greek letter sororities both locally and nationally.

New/Associate Member (formerly referred to as a pledge) – This student has accepted a bid or invitation from a Greek organization but has not been initiated.

Order of Omega (National Greek Leadership Honor Society) – Order of Omega is an honor society for Greek members who demonstrate outstanding leadership and superior academic performance.

Orientation/New Member Education – A time in which the new members learn about the sorority/fraternity, its members and chapter activities at the local and inter/national levels.

Panhellenic Council (PC) – The governing body National Panhellenic Conference sororities on each campus.

Philanthropy – An activity sponsored by a sorority or fraternity designed to raise money for charity and/or to benefit the community.

Pin (two types) – Active pin or badge, a distinctive insignia worn on the chest designating an active member of a particular fraternity or sorority. The new member pin is an insignia used to designate a new member of a particular fraternity or sorority.

Potential New Member (formerly referred to as a rushee) – A PNM is a person going through recruitment because he/she is interested in becoming a member of a fraternity or sorority.

Preference Card – The PNM uses this as their formal membership acceptance.

Quota – Specified number of potential new members each fraternity and sorority can have as new members.

Recommendation – A written statement in support of a woman for a sorority written by an alumna member of that organization.

Recruitment Counselor (formerly Rho Chi) – Greek woman or man who guides prospective members through the recruitment process and they are completely disaffiliated with their Greek organization so as to provide objective advice and support.

Ritual – The traditional secret ceremonies of a fraternity or sorority.

Silence – Period of time when conversation and contact between potential new members, sorority actives, new members, alumnae, and agents is strictly limited by the Panhellenic Recruitment Rules.

Sorority – A group of women bonded together by their ritual that contains the founding principles, ideals and aspirations of the group.

Southern Greek Leadership Conference (SGLC) – SGLC is a regional conference for IFC, PC, National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC), Multicultural Greek Council (MGC) and Greek leaders to attend.

Total – The number of members of a given fraternity or sorority chapter. The university usually sets this number and factors in the number of chapters on campus.

Undergraduate Interfraternity Institute (UIFI) – A four day leadership institute held each summer that bring Greek student leaders from across the country. This is one of the best institutes in the country and is tailored exclusively for Greek leaders.

- If you have a friend or relative that would like to write you a recommendation for a particular sorority, in lieu of the area reference chairman, please notify the ARC and provide the contact information of the lady who will be writing the recommendation.
- Register with your college Panhellenic this is very IMPORTANT! You will receive information about recruitment during summer break.
- Two to three weeks prior to Recruitment call the college Panhellenic office to make sure they received your information. Some things do get lost in the mail.
